

HALL OF FAME

Kenyon Athletic Hall of Fame Inducts Jeffrey Katowitz '90

Delts make up more than half of Athletic Hall of Fame male members.



On September 19, Kenyon inducted **Jeff Katowitz** (**Chi** '**90**) into the Kenyon Athletic Hall of Fame. Jeff is the only male athlete in Kenyon track and field history to win at least one All-America award in four consecutive seasons. He specialized in the javelin and was one of just three athletes to win four consecutive NCAC titles in the event. He set both the

Kenyon and conference records in the event and placed top-ten at nationals in each of his four seasons. In his freshman season he was national runner-up.

Jeff is the 16th Delt to be inducted into the Kenyon Athletic Hall of Fame. Members of Delta Tau Delta represent more than 50% of the male members of the Athletic Hall of Fame.
